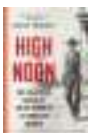


Cafe Neandertal: Excavating Our Past in One of Europe's Most Ancient Places

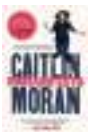

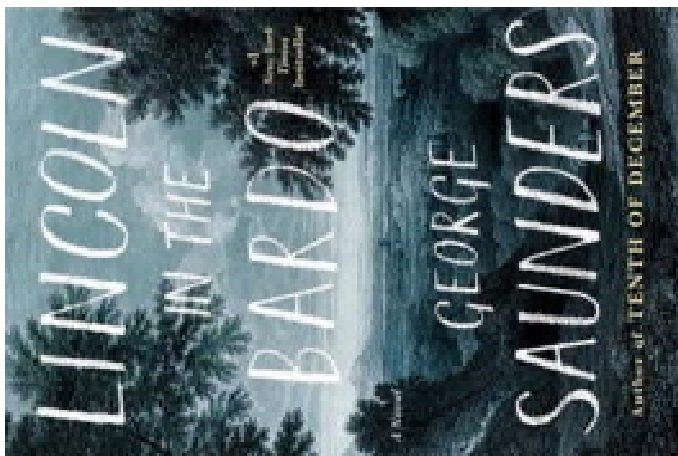
